Indigenous Literacy Foundation

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation (ILF) is a national charity of the Australian Book Industry, working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander remote Communities across Australia. It is Community-led, responding to requests from remote Communities for culturally relevant books, including early learning board books, resources, and programs to support Communities to create and publish their stories in languages of their choice.

In remote Communities across Australia there is often no infrastructure such as libraries or bookstores. Access to reading material is extremely limited and this impacts the opportunities for Indigenous children.

The Indigenous Literacy Foundation's programs focus on ensuring access to quality resources, including books in First Languages, publishing Community stories and empowering Communities and families to lead the entire process to ensure leadership, ownership, and authenticity is held with both Community Elders and members.

bassador Alison Lester had the opportunity to work with a group of students from Milikapiti School with Tiwi Elder Nina Black.


"Often the words don't come until the children start doing the art," Alison says. "In this instance we all came together in a classroom on a really hot sleepy day when no one had any energy. It was on this day, that one of the students sparked the idea – what is the Tiwi most loved animal?"

The story *Ngaripirtangaya* was then developed over a series of edits and illustration workshops during 2020 and 2021, all done remotely due to COVID-19.

"It is such a magical experience to see the joy generated through art and a little guidance to create these books, and the beautiful productions that are then taken back to Community are very special. When I look back on my time working in remote Communities, I used to take out a printer and make a few copies to leave at the school. Now with the Indigenous Literacy Foundation having financial independence through philanthropic donations and gifts in Wills, they can really back a project. This has incredible meaning to our remote Communities – having access to high quality books that are about them, written in their language that they can read to their children," Alison says.

Ha, ha, ho, pop, po buzz, splish what is mak

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was a visit to Jawoyn country in the Northern Territory, where I came to understand how talented the children in remote Communities were with languages, often speaking up to five. That first visit opened my eyes to the beauty of First Nations peoples' Country and culture and how profoundly culturally illiterate so many white Australians are, myself included. There is still so much to learn.

It sparked an idea to work in collaboration with our remote Communities to help bring their stories to life, in their languages, in books that could be published and shared in their schools and homes. As a result, the Indigenous Literacy Foundation was formed.

One of the countless highlights of

doing this work is attending book launches in Community. I remember the day after a book launch in Gunbalanya, West Arnhem Land, a parent told me that they went home and their child made them read the book twenty times at least. That definitely makes your heart sing.

Children deserve the best and brightest future that we can give them, which is why I have made a commitment to leaving a gift in my Will, so that the Indigenous Literacy Foundation will continue this important work. What could be better than leaving a gift in your Will, knowing that your legacy will support literacy development, and together send positive messages of love and support to remote Communities.

Our Book Supply program provides new, culturally relevant books to remote Communities across Australia. Schools, Community health, and women's centres working in remote Communities, can order books to distribute to children and families



Our Book Buzz program aims to develop familiarity and engagement with books for children under five through a daily dedicated Story Time session, so children can develop critical pre-literacy skills

How can I leave a gift in my Will?

After you have looked after your family and loved ones, there are a number of ways you may choose to leave a gift in your Will to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

Pamela Lofts Bequest

In 2013 the Indigenous Literacy Foundation was fortunate to receive an enduring gift from the Estate of the late Pamela Lofts, one of Australia's most celebrated children's book illustrators. Pamela gifted the royalties from her illustrations in some of Australia's most loved children's books including *Koala Lou, Wombat Stew* and *Snug as a Hug.* With this incredibly generous gift, the Indigenous Literacy Foundation has established a dedicated program to nurture and reward promising young Indigenous writers and illustrators/artists through a week-long camp.

The selected teenage participants learn from mentors; children's authors or illustrators, who engage and support them in a publishing project. The program aims to make good storytellers better storytellers, instil confidence and pride, and give a glimpse into possibilities and opportunities for writing and illustration.

Jack was a man of all trades: a handyman, a teacher, an ecologist, an ornithologist, a writer, father, grandfather and husband. He was passionate about many things, especially conservation. Sharing his love of the natural world with children brought him great joy.

Jack was a renowned and published ecologist but when he retired his passion for writing turned to poetry, where he enjoyed creating stories about Australia's natural and cultural heritage.

In 2015, he discovered a new passion when I introduced him to local Aboriginal Communities and the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

Between 2017 – 2022, Jack published four poetry books and most of the proceeds from the sale of these books was donated to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation. As he became more aware of the scope of ILF, Jack decided to make a generous bequest.

Books are a gift and should be available to all children everywhere. Indeed, even to the remotest parts of Australia, which is the legacy of a bequest to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

Obtaining legal advice and suggested wording

To make a gift in your Will to the Indigenous Literacy Foundation we suggest the following wording:


